

Claude Latour and Dawn Dumont take the faceless nature of contemporary colonial power and make it visible. Dumont through the use of irony and Latour through the use of symbolic action.

Each in turn exposes the hypocrisy of most acceptable forms of engagement with this faceless power. Latour literally shoots Indian Act in order to kill it symbolically. Dumont unravels the straight-jacket logic of colonial stereotypes.

In this black comedy, Chris Akapew, a Cree man, finds himself locked in an interrogation room. Chris has no idea of how he got there, or even why he is there. A Voice informs him that he has been convicted of "being an Indian man." The comedy, shot on video, was inspired by Franz Kafka's "The Trial". Certain of his innocence, Chris discovers the true nature of his crimes. Everyone please rise, Kangaroo Court is now in session.

"The Indian Male" is Dumont's first video, made as a part of the "Transference" project through ED Video.

"Where to begin? I grew up in an Aboriginal community but I attended a mainstream (read: white) school. This is my way of confronting those racist stereotypes held by the Canadian public and those that found their way into my heart."





Alanis Obomsawin, a member of the Abenaki Nation, is one of Canada's most distinguished documentary filmmakers. This programme features two groundbreaking films from her extensive body of work: "Christmas At Moose Factory" and "Richard Cardinal: Cry From A Diary of A Métis Child". Obomsawin's earliest work "Christmas At Moose Factory" was one of the first animated works by an Aboriginal artist and was a landmark for filmmaking in Canada. This film demonstrates her unique approach to the discipline of filmmaking and also to her subjects, the children of Moose Factory. "Richard Cardinal: Cry From A Diary of A Métis Child" brought national attention to the urgent issue of the devastating impact of the child welfare system on Aboriginal children. Both films contributed to creating a momentum for Aboriginal film and represent milestones on the landscape of Canadian cinema. An interview with Alanis Obomsawin will follow this screening.

#### **Christmas At Moose Factory**

In this beautiful animated film, drawn and narrated by the Swampy Cree children of Moose Factory, Obomsawin subtly reveals the duality of values lived by many Indigenous communities. Christmas hymns translated to Cree, Indian angels and Cree fiddlers all pay tribute to the creativity and strength of this Moose Factory community.

### Richard Cardinal: Cry From A Diary of A Métis Child

Director: Alanis Obomsawin

"Richard Cardinal was found hanging from a birch tree in the back yard of his last foster home and he was Métis. From the age of 4 to 17 he had lived in 28 different placement situations throughout Alberta including 16 foster homes and 12 group homes, shelters and locked facilities. Richardiary..." So begins one of Obomsawin's most powerful tracing the life and death of Richard Cardinal, whose late journal contributed to the inquiry which exposed the of inadequacy in the child welfare system and promplement changes in child welfare administration and promplement.

For 31 years, Alanis Obomsawin has directed docum with strong social content, inspired by the desire to let t es of her people be heard. Obomsawin began her can singer, writer and storyteller, but dove into filmmaking with "Christmas at Moose Factory". Since then, Obo has made over 20 uncompromising documentaries of affecting Aboriginal people in Canada in "Kanehsatake: 270 Years of Resistance" (1993), "K Whiskey Trench" (2000), "Is the Crown at War With Us? and "Our Nationhood" (2003).

Obomsawin's many honours include the Toronto Womei and Television's (TWIFT) Outstanding Achievement A Direction, the National Aboriginal Achievement Award, Outstanding Contributions Award from the Canadian S and Anthropology Association (CSAA). The latter marks time that the CSAA has honoured someone who is not demic in the field of sociology and anthropology.

Obomsawin also received a fellowship from the Ontario of Art, an Honorary Doctor of Letters from York Unive. Honorary Doctor of Laws from Concordia University Honorary Doctor of Literature from Carleton University.

Alanis Obomsawin's films have won dozens of major tional awards, and have been seen on television and vals around the world. In 1983, she was named a me the Order of Canada, the country's highest honour.

The next day, the young fellow was back at home, suffering from hypothermia, but his parents were never found. Three days ago, Andrew let himself be talked into going out on

that same ice with his friend, to place some flowers at the spot where the family drove through. And now he's in the Commercial, trying to obliterate the memories of what he saw. "Ice Screams" was produced in Toronto by Gregory J. Sinclair. Drew Hayden Taylor is an award-winning playwright, journalist, filmmker and author. He is from Curve Lake First Nation.


#### Patrice Mousseau In The Morning

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
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
