





The Basket

"I am interested in history: the story of the river in northern Ontario where I am from, the legends of the women who came before me. This pale object reminds me of them and illuminates their nearness."

~ Bonnie Devine

Bonnie Devine's work is largely informed by Serpent River, the land she comes from and the home of her people on the north shore of Lake Huron. Sacred to the Anishnawbek people, Serpent River has been ravaged by the uranium mining industry since the early 1950s, forcing many in the community to move away. *The Basket* is a testament to the continuum of the artist's people and culture in the face of industrial greed and abuse.

With *The Basket*, Devine has created a serene object traditionally woven with an eye to the continuing thread of the past, but with a distinctly modern material: coaxial cable. Delicate and durable, the basket is a meditation on land, history, memory, human relationships and survival.

Devine describes this piece as "tough and complicated with language-carrying, picture-carrying veins." Embedded in the basket are tiny monitors, silently looping *The Dreamer*, a subtle video work reflecting on land, reservations and broken promises.

Bonnie Devine is a member of the Serpent River First Nation in northern Ontario. She is a sculpture and installation graduate of the Ontario College of Art and Design and York University. An Ontario Graduate Scholar, she has received numerous awards including the Robert Markle Scholarship, the Norman Jewison Prize for First Nations Art, the S.L. Simpson Award, and the 2002 Arts Toronto Protégé Award in Visual Art. She lives and works in Toronto.

Shaman, Rockabilly, War Vet, Drunk, Coyote: these are but a few of the personas occupied by renowned artist James Luna in his performance-based installation, *Petroglyphs in Motion*. Using the petroglyph as a starting point, Luna presents a non-linear history of the Native American man, exposing some of the stereotypes and challenges he faces every day. Using humour and satire, he condemns the society that introduced alcohol and substance abuse to Native peoples, commodified their traditional cultures, and denied them social equality. Luna further questions the notion of authenticity, refusing to accept constricting and dehumanizing mainstream ideas of what makes a "real Indian"

In a performance that takes his audience from laughter one minute to discomfort the next, Luna is unafraid to confront the realities of Native life, particularly reservation life, in all of its complexities.

A resident of the La Jolla Reservation in California, James Luna (Luiseno) has received international acclaim for his performance and installation work. His art has been showcased at many venues, including the Whitney Biennial, the New Museum of Contemporary Art, the National Gallery of Canada and the Nippon International Performance Art Festival in Japan. He was recently selected by the National Museum of the American Indian for the 2005 Venice Biennale, where he featured a new work that showed historical and cultural parallels between Italy and Indigenous America.




